Dear Parents and Carers,

This week on Tuesday I was delighted to accompany Mrs Brown and the Year Six Mission team to the 2019 Education Mass and Mission Symposium. The mass was celebrated by Bishop Vincent, and he spoke to the children about the quest for love. He asked, "What is love? What does it mean to us as individuals?" The Gospel reading for Tuesday comes from the Gospel of Matthew, and in it, one of the disciples approached Jesus and asked Him, "Who is the greatest in the Kingdom of Heaven?" Jesus called a child over and placed this child in the midst of the crowd. He said to them that "unless

you turn and become like children, you will not enter the Kingdom of Heaven. Whoever becomes humble like this child is the greatest in the Kingdom of Heaven. And whoever receives one child such as this in my name receives me." (Mtt 18:1-5)

On Tuesday it was evident where love was and what it meant to the students in the Parramatta Diocese. The love was shown for others in their fundraising initiatives, in their activities to promote social justice, and in their care for creation - the response to *Laudato Si*

The internet provides a powerful resource for learning, as well as an efficient means of communication and time saving practices. Its use in the home can provide a number of specific benefits, including the development of independent learning and research skills, communication and collaboration and the ability to complete tasks that were previously very time consuming.

Despite the educational and social benefits of information and communication technologies, there are risks associated with their use, particularly for school age students. Many children and adolescents

accessing the internet using a computer or another enabled device will be confronted with material that is disturbing or inappropriate. Although there are technological measures that can be adopted to minimise risks, the best strategy is to educate children as early as possible about the benefits and dangers



of using the internet. It is extremely important to instruct children about how to be 'street-smart', or perhaps a better term is 'net-smart', and to use the internet in a safe and responsible manner.

Whilst online children face the risk of exposure to material that is pornographic, sexually explicit or offensive, hateful or violent, or that encourages activities that are dangerous or illegal. Such materials can be accessed via apps or newsgroups, shared in peer-to-peer (P2P) networks, or sent via email or instant messaging services. Access of such material may occur inadvertently through searching for educational content about people, places or issues. Parents should be aware of safe searching techniques and advise students how to deal with unsolicited inappropriate material.

Your children don't have all the answers when it comes to the use of technology. They may know more about how to operate a computer or a mobile phone or upload a video on Youtube and have a social messaging account, but just because some adults may consider themselves a technological troglodyte, it doesn't mean that they have no place supervising children's use of technology. Adults have one thing that children don't have - life experience - which for most translates into wisdom. Adults know, for example, that things aren't always what they appear to be. They know that while most people in this world are decent and caring, there are a few who will take advantage of others and you can find these people on the Internet just as you would in "the real world".

Parents also need to know that taking away a child's online privileges could backfire by prompting him or her to go into stealth mode by finding hidden ways to get online. Even if you install an internet filter, children today can find another way to access inappropriate online content by bypassing the filter. Although for the majority, the filter will work as intended you need to be aware that the idea of a filter being a 'net nanny' is not accurate. The best filter is the parent or caregiver in the household monitoring what is on the screen. In addition, children using a laptop with wireless capabilities can leach onto someone else's wireless internet connection. Modern phones have web browsers and some even have special software for getting onto social networks and with this in mind you the parent or caregiver can not be looking over the shoulder all the time, which all leads to the fact that - regardless of what technology parents try to employ, the best filter is the one that runs in the young person's brain - not on a computer.

Guidelines for parents

By taking responsibility for your children's online computer use, parents can greatly minimize any potential risks of being online. Make it a family rule to:

- > If your child is young consider being with your child when he or she is on the Internet.
- Warn your child not to give out identifying information.
- > Get to know the services your child uses.
- > Never allow a child to arrange a face-to-face meeting with another computer user without parental permission.
- Remind your children to never respond to messages that are suggestive, obscene, belligerent, threatening, or make them feel uncomfortable.
- Remember that everything you read online may not be true.

- > Set reasonable rules and guidelines for computer use by your children. Sit down together and create a family computer usage agreement.
- Consider using parental controls but know their limitations.
- > Keep the computer in a family room rather than the child's bedroom. A computer in a Childs bedroom does not have to be connected to the internet.
- > Supervise and monitor the use of the internet with your family. If issues arise address them quickly and know who to report problems.
- Encourage and support your family with their use of the internet. Teach them to make right decisions and increase the levels of responsibility as children get older.
- > Understand what a device does before you buy. Make sure any device you purchase is appropriate to the age and experience of your child.
- > Become familiar with the mobile technologies your children use or are introduced to by their friends.
- > Don't give your children mobile phones just for the sake of it inform yourself of all the risks and benefits before making a decision. Don't use prepaid mobile phone accounts if you need to monitor usage or manage SMS addiction.
- Involve your children in decision-making about internet accounts, mobile phone services and price plans so that they share responsibility for the cost of their activities online.




This was a great opportunity for our students to witness the contributions that many of the schools in our Diocese make to the mission of the Church.

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

We believe that all human beings are made in the image of God and that all human beings matter.

The Church maintains the vigorous defence of the dignity of the human person. This includes the protection of life from conception to natural death.

I have been closely following this abortion debate as it has unfolded in our parliament and across the public sphere. I join my voice with my brother bishops and many people of goodwill across many faiths who are alarmed at the newly-proposed NSW abortion legislation.

It is not enough to argue that this legislation is simply about "decriminalising abortion." What's at stake is far more complex and goes to the heart of a healthy society. As human beings, we all have a responsibility to care for each other.

Pope Francis reminds us bluntly: "It is not right to kill a human being, regardless of how small it is, to solve a problem."

Whilst we affirm the sacredness of all life, the Church as a community of faith, hope and love stands by pregnant women to offer them support. That is why, closely linked to protection of the unborn is the ongoing care of women who are pregnant, especially those in difficult personal circumstances.

Our legislators and community need to provide more practical care and compassion to women facing these decisions.

In our diocese, our CatholicCare services offers a comprehensive pregnancy-related service for women and families that are expecting a baby. We want to help women in these complex situations.

Being born into this wondrous planet of ours is a blessing. May each of us, given this precious gift, never forget to pray with the Psalmist: "You created my inmost self, knit me together in my mother's womb. For so many marvels I thank you; a wonder am I, and all your works are wonders." Psalms 139.

This is an ongoing critical issue where the Church will continue to speak prophetically.
