Dear Parents and carers,

This week we enter the fourth week of Lent. The gospel reading this week was one of the most well-loved parables of all scripture - The Parable of the Prodigal Son. It is rather a misleading title, and possibly should be renamed to reflect the role that the father has in forgiving both of his sons. This parable has two goals: it shows us that God wants everyone to know his love, and it shows us that God wants those who know his love to experience

it more deeply. Let's take a look at the first son: He took what he was entitled to, squandered it and returned empty handed, asking for his father's forgiveness. He was in a sense "dead" because of the sins he had committed, but the moment he returned it was as if he had been brought back to life. Jesus used this character to describe people who have not accepted the love that God has for them. They need to turn to God and come home to him. These are the people that God wants us to pray for, so that they may have a conversion. The second son also had a conversion of sorts. He was already "alive" - faithful and hardworking. But his thoughts were sinful, and he needed a different type of conversion. A turning away from anger, self-righteousness and resentment. Even when we try our hardest to live good lives we can fall into this second category. And so God asks us to keep turning to him for love and help and healing. God is always waiting for us with open arms.

"Thank you, Father, for welcoming me home. Amen"



Last week I attended a Mathematics professional learning opportunity alongside all of our Kindergarten and Year One and Two teachers. The day required a lot of hard thinking on our part, but our pedagogies around teaching Mathematics was deepened, and for me anyway, the "penny dropped" when the presenter talked about the need for children to struggle with a problem for a while. So often, as parents and teachers, we try to create a smooth pathway for our children. We don't want them to struggle, as we may have in the past. But it is within this struggle that real learning, deep and lasting learning begins and grows.

A colleague shared an interesting article with me this week, about a new term for parents - concierge parents. I particularly enjoyed the section where the principal of a high school reminded the parents that when their children were learning to ride a bike, **they wobbled**. As children are learning we need them to wobble a bit. Deep learning does not happen when information is handed to children on a plate. The wobble is when they make sense of something, make connections between things and show that they are ready to transfer their knowledge to another situation.



Mrs Clarke mentioned in her article, above, the importance of letting our children wobble. I want to share with you a short story and reflection on a moment that made me realise, as a parent, I have to let my children wobble.

Last Friday evening, I stood at the counter of my kitchen tidying up after dinner. From the lounge room, I hear the voice of my daughter asking if she could have something for dessert. She continued, and asked if I could get a piece of caramel slice from the fridge.

As I put down the bowl in my hand and went to turn to walk towards the fridge I stopped myself. My thoughts immediately went to, "Oh my gosh! I am a concierge parent."

I had become the helpdesk that my children see as a way to escape the wobble of their days. I then reflected on on how many times have I rushed in to solve their little problems and the damage I was doing to their ability to be resilient problem solvers in the future.

Time to change! I realised I was doing more harm than good.

To often, we as parents, feel the need to be able to swoop in and fix the problem. From little things like getting the caramel slice out of the fridge when they can't be bothered to get up and get it themselves or bringing in their lunch box, to the school office, when they have left it at home in the morning.

When I said no, to my daughter, I am doing something else at the moment and I am sure you are more than capable of working out how to get the caramel slice yourself, I wondered what she would do if she left her lunch box at home. My wife and I both work, so we are not available to respond to the ding from the concierge desk.

I know she would either work out how to get by for the day by asking for help, or by experiencing the loss of no food for the day, she would probably not forget her lunch box next time.

Sometimes we have to let go and let them wobble through their day. It is through the wobble that they learn to get back up again.

COMPULSORY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE - INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

In NSW school attendance is compulsory for children over the age of six years until the minimum school leaving age of 17 years.

What if my child has to be away from school?

If your child has to be absent from school, you must tell the school and provide a reason for your child's absence. To explain an absence parents and carers may:

- send a Skoolbag note, or handwritten note to the class teacher,
- telephone the school, or
- visit the school

A small number of absences may be justified if your child:

- attends a special religious ceremony
- is required to attend to a serious and/or urgent family situation (e.g. a funeral)
- is too sick to go to school or has an infectious illness

Children need to arrive on school and class on time. Lateness to school or leaving early from school will be recorded as a partial absence.

Application for Leave

If you are planning a holiday during term time, you must contact the school and ask for an Application for Leave School form. This is required for any any planned absences that is greater than 5 days. The principal will consider your application and decide whether to grant a Certificate of Leave from Attendance at School.

Responsibilities of the school principal

Principals are able to question requests for a child to be absent from school and are also responsible in deciding if the reason given for an absence is justified. Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation for long or frequent absences explained by parents as being due to illness.

When absences are unexplained by parents, or explanations are not accepted by the principal, the school will work with parents to identify the reasons for non-attendance and put in place strategies so the child can return to school. Principals may ask support staff or other agencies to assist.

What if my child continues to have unsatisfactory attendance?

It is important to understand that the NSW Department of Education (DoE), on behalf of the State Minister for Education, may take further action in cases where children of compulsory school age have recurring

numbers of unexplained or unacceptable absences from school. The following actions may be taken in these cases:

> Attendance planning meetings

Parents, and sometimes their child, can be asked to attend a meeting with school personnel. The aim of the meeting is to help identify strategies to support the child and family and remove barriers to non-attendance. Other agencies may also be invited, if parents agree.

Attendance Conferences

If school attendance does not improve, parents and sometimes their child, can be asked to attend an Attendance Conference. The conference aims to help the school, parents and other agencies to further identify the issue impacting on a child's attendance. The outcome of an attendance conference is for the parties to agree to undertake certain actions to improve the child's attendance. These actions are agreed in writing.
