From the Principal

Last weekend I took advantage of the beautiful weather and went to the beach. It was a bit too cold to swim, but walking along the water's edge was very peaceful and relaxing. As we walked, we came across the remains of a sandcastle that someone had built. It had once been huge, by the looks of it, but now it was just a large mound of sand, it's features unrecognisable. As we walked closer to the rocks there was another sandcastle, and this one was still intact. On closer inspection, this castle

had actually been built with the rock bed as the base, so even though the sea water swirled around it, it remained upright and all its features were able to be seen. Every building needs a solid foundation to start with, even before any bricks are laid. Without foundations dug deep into the ground, a building is likely to collapse at the first sign of a strong wind or storm. Jesus once explained to his Disciples that anyone who listens to Him and acts as he instructs will be like the person who dug a deep foundation for his house, deep into the rock bed. And when the storm came, bringing flood waters, the house was unshaken. However, if we do not act as Jesus wants us too, we are like the person who built their house without a strong foundation. When the storm came, and the flood waters rose, the house washed away. At St. Finbar's everything we do is designed to lay solid foundations for our students, both spiritually and academically. We teach our students that if they follow Jesus' words then their actions will follow suit. In the parable, the storms of life came and the house built on the sand fell. The house built on the rock stood firm. We believe that if our students have a good, strong foundation they will be able to act in ways that show their beliefs. I saw a great example of this last week when we farewelled Father Jolly. Our students were asked to write their thoughts and prayers for Father Jolly on a star shaped card. Many students wrote about his actions, how they made an impact and how he made them feel. The Gospel reading we used was about being the salt of the earth and a light in the darkness. Father Jolly has consistently been a light in the darkness for our students. He has taught them to shine in so many ways, by following the words and actions of Jesus.

As a farewell gift, we gave Father Jolly a star visible in the southern sky, named after him. We made sure we bought an extra bright one! His certificate of ownership had the following inscription:



"A star has always been a symbol of where we can find love and faith.

You have been our shining star for over five years. May your light continue to shine with your new community. Love from the students, families and staff of St Finbar's Glenbrook."

We wish Father Jolly all the very best as he embarks on an exciting new adventure at Stanhope Gardens.

with a form of blood cancer and is currently in Nepean hospital undergoing chemotherapy.



schooling years.

I would like to thank the staff, who have joined this important team, for their time, diligence, professionalism, shared knowledge and commitment to improving our school.

The Learning with Diversity Project Team will meet each week between weeks 8 of Term 3 and Week 4 of Term 4, to formulate recommendations for the School Leadership Team that will maximise student learning for learners with significant needs.

The project team, in developing its recommendations, will:

- Review current staffing structures that are used to support students with significant needs and make recommendations about future staffing and support structures.
- Review programs that are currently in place to support students with significant needs and make



recommendations about future programming.

- Identify quality-teaching practices, underpinned by research, that supports students with Down syndrome, ASD (including PDA), Anxiety, and ADHD.
- Create a school environment for staff and students that emphasises the importance of diversity and underpins the Gospel values John 10:10 I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full.

I know that you will join me in thanking them for the work ahead and pray that the Holy Spirit will be with them on this journey.

In addition, I have been working on my own learning journey that investigates new ways that we can challenge and support our learners who need extension with their problem solving, critical and creative thinking, abstract, verbal and numerical reasoning, cross disciplinary thinking and critical analysis.

Starting next term, selected students across Years 3-6 will be invited to participate in challenging learning tasks, supported by the CSIRO, to develop these skills.

I look forward to being able to provide you updates next term.

Finally, a reminder that Monday, 12 October, has been designated a Staff Professional Learning Day. This day will be a welcome opportunity for our staff to explore and understand the uses of robotics in Science, Mathematics and Literacy. We will also be exploring the pedagogy behind STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) and engaging in hands-on STEM activities that will benefit our students in their learning.

We are looking forward to this day of intense professional learning, and thank you for making alternate arrangements for your children on this day.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION DRAFT NEW CURRICULUM - STAGE TWO UPDATE

'Moral dilemma'- two words that are circulating the Stage Two classroom, as students prepare to perform a shadow puppet scenario to their teachers and peers.

After lots of discussion about free will, conscience and informed conscience, reading of Scriptures and a range of higher order thinking activities, Stage Two are bringing together all their new learning and are currently working on their Learning Cycle Assessment Task.

In small groups, students have been challenged to create a moral dilemma scenario showing the role of an informed conscience. Students need to make reference to Sacred Scripture, Catholic values and traditions, the Golden Rule and how these help to form our conscience.

Last week, students participated in a 'critical friends process' whereby the groups presented their ideas so far to their peers, who gave constructive feedback to the groups. Students used the feedback to continue developing their puppet plays to include all the criteria required.

It has been a wonderful experience to see all our students so engaged in their learning, and transferring their new knowledge to other parts of the curriculum as well.

Next term all stages will be implementing a learning cycle from the new RE Draft Curriculum and I look forward to sharing their learnings with you.

PBS4L - Possum Magic - A New Level of Support



Schools are responsible for teaching academics and social behaviour skills. We teach all students our academic curriculum to address stage level outcomes. We teach all students to be safe, respectful, responsible learners in the classroom, walkways, playground and all other settings. We know that by having clear universal expectations that we can teach, practice and recognise every day helps create a predictable and positive learning environment.

However, some students do not respond to our quality universal academic and behavioural instruction. Students who need additional support may display behaviours externally or of equal concern, are students who internalise the stress of school and

home. The goal is to provide support to these students to meet their needs, to keep them in class learning and to avoid escalation to more intensive services.

We are changing the way we think about student behaviour. Behaviour is not good or bad, rather repeated problem behaviour serves a purpose for the student. Problem behaviour pays off for the student by getting what is wanted or avoiding what is uncomfortable, difficult or even boring. Misbehaviour is also a form of communication that is generally very effective in getting needs met. Misbehaving works so students do it again. Our job is to make a professional judgment (hypothesize) about what purpose or function the behaviour is serving the student and then decide what we can do to get that need met in a safe, respectful, responsible way.

Our new level of support, Possum Magic, will be trialled next term by our newly trained staff. After a process of review and evaluation, we look forward to launching Possum Magic with all members of our community next year.

National Child Protection Week: Putting Children First

We all play a part in keeping children and young people safe and ensuring they can live and learn in a safe environment. This National Child Protection Week (6 to 12 September 2020), we pledge commitment to listening to the voices of children and young people and remaining vigilant to their safety and wellbeing.

In support of the National Child Protection Week theme, "Putting Children First", and in line with the National Catholic Safeguarding Standards, Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta (CEDP) is committed to the establishment and implementation of child safe systems, policies and procedures.

The aim is to have in place practices that are proactive and preventative in nature, providing children and young people with school environments where they are safe, informed, participate, and where the adult community, working together with children and young people, work towards making this happen.

Recently, CEDP have moved from what was primarily Child Protection to Safeguarding, which requires us to do things differently, enabling a greater level of proactivity, children's voice and building all-round knowledge for what is safe behaviour when working with students and children. The CEDP Safeguarding team's role is to support the implementation of the Standards, to manage concerns raised about employees, Working With Children Checks (WWCC), and to provide training, education and support to the CEDP community.

By providing the community with the knowledge, support and procedures to keep children and young people safe we are equipping everyone with the tools and skills needed to be ambassadors of child safety! Throughout 2020, CEDP's Safeguarding Team have been working on many projects to align with the National Catholic Safeguarding Standards.

Covid-19 Guidelines for Church

WEARING OF FACE MASKS HIGHLY RECOMMENDED IN CHURCHES

- v The Parramatta Diocese is therefore officially recommending that all worshippers in the Diocese of Parramatta wear a mask to Mass. This would be as people arrive on parish grounds, during Mass and afterwards as they leave. During Communion, the mask may be removed, but it should be in place at all other times.
- v Priests, cantors and readers who cannot wear a mask to conduct their duties at Mass, must always observe appropriate social distancing.
- v We understand the inconvenience that masks may pose, but the health of our parishioners and the wider community is our highest concern.
- By Public Health Order, it is now a condition of entry that all attending churches are requested to provide information for contact tracing and recording purposes.
- Parishioners attending Mass must now also be asked to confirm that they are not unwell; not experiencing cold or flu-like symptoms; do not have a temperature; have not been in contact with anyone suspected of or having covid-19.

If anyone thinks their answer is 'yes' to any of these questions, they are asked not to come to the church that day.

- Our Church capacity is limited to 100 persons; our hall 50; meeting room to 12; and the parish office, to just 2 persons.
- NSW Health also remind those of us over 70, or any with an underlying illness, wherever possible, we should avoid crowded spaces where 1.5 metre physical distancing cannot be maintained.
- The Diocese has also sent a reminder that:
- 1. the current dispensation from Bishop Vincent applies releasing all Catholics from fulfilling their Sunday obligations of attending Mass; and
